<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Increased participation in SEND sport through Panathlon and ESSP events. Multiple sporting successes achieved in ESSP competitions. Purchased new PE kit. Received sponsors for our new purchased sports kit. Organised a successful second visit from an inspirational athlete through 'Sports for Champions' due to it being the year of the Olympics. This inspired and encouraged children to visualise success and strive to achieve their sporting goals. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Children have attended multiple events, bringing Gold home in one. Pupil voice highlighted how children enjoyed having this opportunity. Children were enthused when returning from competitions, particularly those where medals were won: Sports Hall Athletics county champions; gold for the girls' Cricket team and Y2 Athletics teams; cup winners for the Girls Football Team; and 4 children qualified to represent the Easington District in the County Athletics Finals. During a learning enquiry, it was evident that expectations were high as all children wore the correct Ribbon PE kit. Additionally, new sports kit has created unity amongst all teams, driving children to perform well for their teams. This visit was extremely successful, resulting in our school raising £452.71 and £301.81 for the athlete. Pupil voice also showed that the children were engaged and inspired by Erin Ward – a professional Scottish footballer. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Less competition for girls' football; therefore, fewer opportunities in the sport. Less children able to swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25m due to the time they had in the pool. Small variety of adult-led sports available at break/lunch times. 	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> Ribbon's girls attended one match and were cup winners for the first time. This highlighted how successful Ribbon's girls could be if they trained together regularly. 45% of children could swim competently, confidently and proficiently over a distance of at least 25m. Through pupil voice, children were keen to be exposed to a wider range of sports on break and lunch times.

Intended actions for 2024/25

Intent	Implementation
<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) Increase engagement of all pupils in physical activity during lunch time to improve physical wellbeing, whilst promoting positive behaviour and attitude. This will include a timetabled schedule of activities to expose children to a wider variety of sports, i.e. cricket, rounders, tennis, netball, basketball, trampolining, team-building activities etc. 2) Durham Country Cricket Club to work with a variety of children for a half term in the hope to interest and engage children in physical activity. 3) To provide more opportunity for practice in swimming to increase attainment of children successfully completing 25 metres. 4) Further develop expertise of teachers in PE, for them to understand and practice effective and responsive teaching strategies to maximise outcomes for all. 5) Increase participation in competitive sport ran by ESSP, CNS and Panathlon to make sport inclusive for all. 6) Purchase of GetSet4PE scheme to continue the development of teacher confidence in the progression of each discipline. 7) More opportunities for girls' football. 	<ol style="list-style-type: none"> 1) CNS and lunch time supervisors to organise and lead a sport to encourage more children to become active. This will ensure broader and more equal experiences of a range of sports are offered. Staff will receive a timetabled schedule to follow so all year groups rotate between the different disciplines. 2) PE Lead to liaise with Chris to organise sessions for Year 6. 3) PE Lead to review current system of children attending swimming and amend the structure to prioritise and provide more time for Year 5 and Year 6. PE Lead to organise an increase in swimming lessons to allow more regular opportunity for groups of children. Data will be monitored throughout the year to assess whether targets are on track to be achieved. PE Lead to also engage with parents to stress the importance of this skill. 4) Use of Ribbon's coaching curriculum and ESSP's CPD to support teachers with progression/responsive teaching strategies in different disciplines. 5) PE Lead to book all competitions available and liaise with DHT regarding buses and staffing. PE coach to prepare children for competitions through lessons and extra-curricular activities. 6) PE Lead to organise renewal of scheme with finance team. Login details/refresher to be re-shared with staff. 7) PE Coach to run trials for a girl's football team. PE Lead and Coach to organise friendlies against Seaham schools to ensure more equal opportunities.

Pupil voice shows an increased awareness of sports and games that are aware of and enjoy playing. <p>2)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Pupil voice showcase children have an increased awareness of the sport cricket, and speak increasingly positive about the game itself. An increased amount of children make links to Murton Cricket Club <p>3)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Pupil voice showcases an increased confidence when it comes to swimming. End of year assessment data increases by at least 10% from last year's <p>4)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Staff confidence shows that 80%+ of teachers feel confident in teaching all areas of PE. Staff feel supported in areas of PE that they have less confidence in. Pupil attainment data showcases 80%+ children are achieving ARE across EY, KS1 and KS 2 <p>5)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Children with SEND show an increased engagement with sport and experience competition and success. Teachers develop an increased confidence and awareness on how to differentiate teaching for all children to access PE. <p>6)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Clear progression of skill development is evident with a unit, as well as progression year upon year. Staff confidence shows that 80%+ of teachers feel confident in teaching all areas of PE. <p>7)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Pupil voice shows that children see football as a game for both boys and girls. What impact/sustainability have you seen?	What evidence do you have?
<p>1)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Both breaktime and lunchtime engagement in sporting activities continues to be high. Children are choosing to engage in a wide variety of sport for both enjoyment and practicing for competition. Children are less reliant on playing football only during these times. They have the skillset and experience to deliver a wider variety of sporting activities including basketball, netball, cricket, dodgeball and hockey. <p>2)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> An increased amount of pupils have joined the local cricket team as a result of the enjoyment of in-school experience. Cricket after-school club was well attended, with both the school's boys and girls team performing well in an inter-school competition. The boys won the competition with the girls coming in a respectable third place. Additional sessions organized in school resulted in children requesting to play cricket more regularly during break and lunch time. <p>3)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Swimming data has significantly improved to 74% of children being able to swim at least 25 meters, utilising a range of strokes and completing water safety expectations. This was a significant 29% increase from last year. Pupil voice showcases an increased confidence and enjoyment when it comes to swimming. <p>4)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Staff confidence shows that 80%+ of teachers feel confident in teaching all areas of PE. Staff feel supported by the Get Set 4 PE programme and feel comfortable to liaise with Sport and PE Lead and Coach, as well as ESSP to further develop their knowledge and confidence. <p>5)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Opportunities for children with SEND to engage in local events has increased this year. Children with SEND show an increased engagement with sport and experience competition and success, sharing more ways to adapt activities making it more accessible for all. <p>6)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> The PE curriculum continues to be progressive in all areas. The skill development of children has been identified as improved. Across all sport competitions this year, the school have performed consistently well in all events coming away as Champions in Netball, Basketball, Cricket, Indoor and Outdoor Athletics, as well as success in other sports. <p>7)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> There has been an increase in girls playing football in school. An increased amount of children trialled for the football team this year allowing us to enter an A and B team in a local competition. 	<p>1)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Participation registers show a high participation rate on a daily basis. Pupil Voice shows an increased awareness of sport, and enjoyment of a variety of sports. <p>2)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Boys cricket team won the East Durham schools competition Girls cricket team came third in the East Durham schools competition. Cricket after school was fully attended. More requests were made for cricket during both break and lunch times. Participation register shows high participation on these days. <p>3)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Swimming data has increased from 45% in 2023/24 to 74% in 24/25 Attending staff have stated an increased confidence in children due to more regular exposure to lessons. <p>4)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Learning Enquiries continue to show staff's happiness with the support they receive from Get Set 4 PE, the Sports Coach and ESSP. Learning Enquiries continue to show an increased confidence with staff's delivery in PE against the plans outlined. <p>5)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> SEND activities and opportunities have increased in the 2024/25 academic year with Ribbon attending all. Learning enquiries highlight that SEND children are fully engaged in all PE lessons. Pupil voice showcases that SEND pupils are fully engaged in all PE lessons and are happy with the adaptations made. <p>6)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Learning enquiries showcase good coverage of all areas of PE and sport as outlined by curriculum documentation. Attainment in PE and sport has increased with more children becoming competent with the skills required in lessons, due to a more progressive system. <p>7)</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Pupil voice highlights more girls enjoy football, with clubs and trials being fully attended. Two girls football teams were created for the first time in Ribbon history.
